The Wausau Free Clinic, a mission of First Presbyterian Church, was established in 2018 by the founding organizers: Jeffrey Oswald, MD, Jeffrey Todd, MS, CMPE, Paula Vogt, RN, Jane Shibilski, and a small team of volunteers. The driving impetus was addressing the unmet primary care needs of low-income, uninsured people, many of whom are immigrants and people of color. Initially, it was planned to remodel space in the church, but an invitation to join a proposed community social service "hub" took the team in a different direction. While waiting for the Community Partners Campus to be built, the medical mission team operated in several temporary facilities over the years, including in a warming center and a church basement. Finally, their 2,500-square-foot state-of-the-art medical facility opened in December 2022. All services are provided free of charge by local volunteer doctors, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurses, support staff, and Medical College of Wisconsin medical students. The clinic expects to provide 2,500 patient visits this year.

Vera Roddy served in the US Air Force/Air Force Reserves from 1977-1992. Her first tour of duty was as an Aircraft Sub-Systems Mechanic in the Eifel Mountains of Germany. As an activated Reservist for the 1991 Gulf War, she served as a Mental Health Technician for an Aeromedical Evacuation Unit on the border of Iraq and Saudi Arabia. Her civilian career included nine years as a Psychometrician in Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation and two years as a Case Manager in the Veterans Assistance Program specializing in Women Veterans, Disabled Veterans, and Families of Veterans experiencing homelessness. Vera holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology and a Certificate in Trauma Counseling from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Since retiring in 2002, she has volunteered in the veterans' community, and in 2010, started the Artful Warriors, a grass-roots peer-led group, for veterans and community partners to connect on creative endeavors. Vera continues to participate in the MCW Warrior Partnership researching moral injury and is an Orban Foundation board member. Her most critical role to date is serving as a Consumer Reviewer for the Department of Defense where her expertise is toxic exposure of military personnel, veterans, and family members.

laong Vang is a 2nd generation Hmong-American. Her parents are refugees from Laos and resettled in Montana where laong and her six other siblings were born and raised. As a mediator between her family and physicians, she has acquired experiences that continue to strengthen her passions and motivate her as a future physician. She is passionate about community engagement and service and has pursued a career in medicine to continue being the bridge to medicine for underserved communities. In addition to her work with refugees and the refugee health curriculum, she is creating a program that introduces medicine and STEM-related professions to young Milwaukee Hmong students and co-founded a curriculum that highlights the diversity of Asian American and Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander populations and their health disparities. She plans to continue community engagement projects in the future to better strengthen relationships with her future patient populations and improve health outcomes.




Karen Dotson is a Milwaukee native. She is passionate about engaging with local and diverse communities and has an extensive history of community service. Since 2020, Karen has served as Program Director for the All of Us Research Program (AoURP) at MCW. In this role, she guides AoURP's outreach and engagement efforts and oversees day-to-day operations for the program. Her responsibilities include recruiting thousands of ethnically and racially diverse individuals from across the Greater Milwaukee area. AoURP aims to lay the foundation for precision medicine through research. Karen's work helps ensure the evolution of precision medicine encompasses the needs of all people. She collaborates effectively with African American churches, veteran organizations, the Social Development Commission, the United Community Center, Federally Qualified Health Centers, and many other organizations. Her approach emphasizes bidirectional communication, equity, and balancing power between small community organizations and large institutions like MCW.

Terri deRoon-Cassini, PhD, MS is a Professor in the Division of Trauma & Acute Care Surgery, Department of Surgery at the Medical College of Wisconsin. She is the Executive Director of the Comprehensive Injury Center, which focuses on violence, suicide, and non-intentional injury prevention locally and statewide. She co-directs the gun violence prevention program, 414LIFE, at Froedtert Hospital and holds appointments in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Medicine, the Institute for Health and Equity, and the Neuroscience Research Center. She is a co-founder of the Milwaukee Trauma Outcomes Project, a research collaborative to investigate outcomes after trauma, particularly for underserved individuals and under-resourced communities. Dr. deRoon-Cassini is a Licensed Psychologist and started the Trauma & Health Psychology Service for the Level 1 Trauma Center at Froedtert Hospital. She has research funding from the National Institute of Mental Health to understand the impact that socioenvironmental stress, including neighborhood violence and discrimination, has on outcomes following trauma.

David Milia, MD is a Wisconsin native who completed his medical school and fellowship training at MCW. He is a trauma surgeon and the Medical Director of the Level 1 Trauma Center at Froedtert Hospital. David is passionate about engaging stakeholders from Milwaukee and surrounding areas to reduce firearm violence. In 2019, Froedtert and the Medical College of Wisconsin partnered with the Office of Violence Prevention to start the hospital responder arm of Milwaukee's Violence Interrupter Program, 414LIFE. Embracing a public health model, the trauma program has worked closely with the community to offer its most vulnerable populations the care and support they need to break the cycle of violence.

The MCW community engagement mission focuses on building productive partnerships with communities in Wisconsin and beyond. Through these partnerships and the relationships that sustain them, MCW and its community collaborators work together to make a greater impact on addressing Wisconsin's critical health needs.

Carnegie Community Engagement Classification

In 2015, the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, which works to develop networks of ideas and institutions to advance teaching and learning, awarded the Community Engagement Classification to the Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) in recognition of MCW's community engagement practices. The Carnegie Community Engagement Classification designation for MCW is an honor and a monumental achievement, as it recognizes the innumerable exemplary



campus-wide programs and initiatives that are focused on excellence in community engagement and on serving the needs of our communities. MCW is now one of four medical schools nationwide that have received this honor.

Richard Guarasci Award for Institutional Transformation



The Richard Guarasci Award for Institutional Transformation recognizes institutions that have successfully implemented institutionwide efforts to address issues of public concern by aligning teaching, research, practice, and values in service of the common good. As a national leader in community engagement, the Medical Campus Compact College of Wisconsin was recognized for this award in 2020 for integrating engagement

into research, education, and clinical care with the goal of advancing health policy and advocacy and addressing the social determinants of health. "Through initiatives like [Advancing a Healthier Wisconsin endowment] and its extended community-engaged research, the Medical College of Wisconsin demonstrates a deep strategic commitment to community. embracing its responsibility as a place-based institution to address diverse health needs throughout Wisconsin."
