Staci Young, PhD

Dr. Staci Young is the Senior Associate Dean for Community Engagement and Director of the Office of Community Engagement at MCW. She is also a Professor in the Department of Family and Community Medicine, Director of the Center for Healthy Communities and Research, the Inaugural Faculty Director for the ThriveOn Collaboration, and the Associate Director for Community Outreach and Engagement for the MCW Cancer Center. She actively teaches and mentors students, is a founding faculty member in the DrPH program, and serves as a research faculty advisor for the student-run Saturday Clinic for the Uninsured. As a medical sociologist, her work demonstrates a deep commitment to examining structural barriers and conditions that contribute to health disparities.



John R. Raymond, Sr., MD

John R. Raymond, Sr., MD, the Medical College of Wisconsin's President and CEO, assumed the position as MCW's sixth President on July 1, 2010. As MCW's President and CEO, Dr. Raymond leads Wisconsin's only private medical school with an operating budget of more than \$1.6 billion. A practicing nephrologist who plays active roles in clinical care, teaching and faculty mentorship, Dr. Raymond also is a medical researcher studying the basic mechanisms of kidney cell function. He has published more than 140 full-length manuscripts and earned nearly \$40 million of grant funding over the course of his career.

414LIFE

Community and hospital-based violence intervention program

"The transformative experiences that staff are afforded display a level of professional investment that demonstrates their commitment. The hospital response team and street outreach workers provide seamless care for persons impacted by gun violence. Milwaukee is better because of 414LIFE."

414LIFE is a community and hospital-based violence intervention program. The program has two components developed on existing evidence-based models - the community component as an adaptation of the Cure Violence (CV) model selected to address community-based violence, and the hospital component as an adaptation of a hospital-based Violence Intervention Program (HVIP) chosen to prevent re-injury after a gunshot wound requiring hospital attention. 414LIFE team members are hired as "credible messengers" who have relevant life experiences, rapport, and/or knowledge to identify and work with individuals or groups who are at high risk for gun violence victimization or perpetuation. This work is centered on individuals and pre-identified priority neighborhoods with the highest rates of gun violence.

Lea S. Denny, of Hawaiian and Filipino heritage, is a licensed therapist and the founder, CEO, and Clinical Director of the Healing Intergenerational Roots (HIR) Wellness Institute. HIR is a women and survivor-led organization supporting survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, sex trafficking, intimate partner violence, and community violence. With over 20 years of experience in mental health, Lea has reimagined access to care for Indigenous and underserved communities. She developed over 20 therapeutic programs and frameworks, including the Community Activated Medicine[™] Framework[™] and CAMPsite[™] model to provide no-cost mental health services to over 6,500 individuals annually. An international keynote speaker and community researcher, she addresses the impacts of historical and intergenerational trauma. Lea is deeply committed to workforce development, having trained over 150 interns through her CAM[™] Advanced Training Placement Clinic. In recognition of her contributions to community mental health and leadership, she was awarded an honorary doctorate from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee this year.



Alenna Beroza earned her biomedical engineering degree at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and a master's in mechanical engineering at Michigan Technological University through the Peace Corps Master's International Program. She taught STEM in rural Tanzania and introduced 3D printing in Western Kenya's health system. Her experiences ignited a passion for sexual and reproductive health, leading her to medical school. As a Dr. Elaine Kohler Global Health Scholar, she worked in Uganda on HPV and cervical cancer prevention for female sex workers. She later completed a dedicated research year in Uganda developing educational programming on this topic for community organizations. Beyond global health, Alenna co-developed a reproductive health simulation model to train resident physicians in abortion-related care, and she leads a nonprofit which provides sex education and raises funds for Wisconsin abortion funds. Committed to becoming a community-engaged physician, Alenna believes in uplifting vulnerable communities to build a healthier society.

From conceptualizing research ideas to implementing projects and disseminating findings, Courtney collaborates with community partners at every stage to ensure transparency, inclusivity, and responsible community research. Born in León, Guanajuato, Mexico, AnaKaren Manriquez Prado immigrated to the South Side of Milwaukee when she was six years old. Currently, she is an IRB Coordinator in the Office of Research, where she supports and advocates for ethical and intentional research. She also leads policy development for the engagement of non-English speakers, contributes to the creation of a shortened consent form, and leads a presentation series on the intersections of research, equity, and justice. Prior to her current role, Ana managed projects addressing cancer disparities and was selected to participate in a national cohort for cancer leadership research training funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH). Since 2019, Ana has promoted and supported research across Wisconsin as a member of the Milwaukee Latino Health Coalition (MLHC) and as co-chair of the Research Action Committee. Drawing on her extensive research and community experiences, Ana is dedicated to facilitating and advocating for inclusive, equitable, and just research practices at all levels and across communities.

Sara Kohlbeck, PhD, MPH, is the Director of the Division of Suicide Research and Healing in the Comprehensive Injury Center and an Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Medicine. Dr. Kohlbeck is also the Assistant Director of the PhD program in Public and Community Health at MCW. Dr. Kohlbeck received her PhD in Public and Community Health from MCW in 2022 and her Master of Public Health from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee in 2015. Her research interests focus on understanding suicide from a public health perspective, specifically on better understanding suicide among disproportionately affected populations, including farmers, veterans, and youth of color, to facilitate the development of appropriate prevention strategies. Dr. Kohlbeck is also engaged in community-based research with communities across Wisconsin who are implementing suicide prevention activities.

Jessica Olson, PhD, MPH, is an Associate Professor in the Division of Community Health who brings together academic, clinical, and community partners to advance equity in maternal health and cancer care. A long-time collaborator with the African American Breastfeeding Network (AABN), Dr. Olson played a key role in launching the WeRISE Doula Initiative, which, to date, has provided community-based doula support to more than 300 families in Southeastern Wisconsin. Her leadership extends across multiple NIH- and state-funded initiatives, including co-leadership of the TEAM Community Partnership Component of the ASCEND WI Initiative, alongside AABN Executive Director Dalvery Blackwell. She brings this commitment to her evaluation work within MCW, where she guides initiatives to build collaborative systems that support all members of the MCW community. Dr. Olson is dedicated to community-driven approaches fostering cross-sector partnerships and sustainable change, improving systems that affect the health and wellbeing of families across Wisconsin.

RECOGNITION

Carnegie Community Engagement Classification

In 2015, the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, which works to develop networks of ideas and institutions to advance teaching and learning, awarded the Community Engagement Classification to the Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) in recognition of MCW's community engagement practices. The Carnegie Community Engagement Classification designation for MCW is an honor and a monumental achievement, as it recognizes the innumerable exemplary campus-wide programs and initiatives that are focused on excellence in community engagement and on serving the needs of our communities.
