A Message from the Chairman

When I first walked into the offices of Medical College of Wisconsin Department of Dermatology as Chair, I was anticipating an adventure in academic medicine that would allow me to contribute, even in a small way, to the growth and development of the department and the careers of the faculty and trainees. Now, seven years later, I can look back and say that my colleagues in the department, be they faculty, trainees, or staff, who have persevered through some unprecedented societal challenges and yet have contributed so much to all the missions of MCW, have made a much greater impact on me than I could ever have on them. I want to take a moment and admire what those who work every day to make healthcare better have accomplished in our department.

One of my first observations when joining the department was the culture of camaraderie and caring that permeated throughout the group. Not only did the department want to do great things, the group wanted to do them together. I think the best example might be the growth of the community engagement mission for the department. Shola Vaughn, MD has led the expansion of our efforts to promote skin health in the underserved in Milwaukee. Between our skin screening efforts in underserved communities starting with our project in collaboration with Gee's Clippers to the expansion of our supervision of the student led free care clinic, the department now has an extensive program to help those in greatest need. The only way these projects can succeed is for so many of our faculty and trainees to make continued effort and take joy in their success. While a ton of credit needs to go to Dr. Vaughn for her extraordinary accomplishments, the growth has been a team effort with many contributing.

From the clinical perspective, the growth of our department has led to specialization and, I believe, a higher level of care in our specialty areas than is available elsewhere in the state. An accounting of our specialty clinics tells the story well with faculty in the department having identified specialties with associated clinics in more than 12 areas and continues to expand with the new onco-dermatology specialty area led by Kassandra Holzem, MD. Few academic or non-academic practices in the Midwest let alone the country can provide that level of specific expertise to patients. MCW residents get intensive learning time with all these experts. Thus, not only do our specialty clinics give outstanding care to our patients, but they also help improve dermatology care for the future.

Research in the department has also thrived and evolved in my time here. There is a greater breadth of research in the department than ever before. Karolyn Wanat, MD has identified a new granulomatous disease related to persistent rubella virus that continues to be funded by the CDC. New clinical trials in pediatric inflammatory disease are being run by Kristi Holland, MD. Melanie Clark, MD and Shola Vaughn, MD are working to better understand the predictors of outcomes in our experience with high-risk squamous cell carcinoma while Julia Kasprzak, MD is collaborating with our colleagues in other

departments to learn about the role of anti-tumor immunity in these patients. Yvonne Chiu, MD is looking into developing outcome measures in pediatric morphea. In conjunction with the PEDRA organization, Leah Lalor, MD is leading an effort to develop a new curriculum for teaching a basic competency in pediatric dermatology to pediatrics residents. We have just been joined by Dr. Shanthi Narla who will take the lead in our clinical trials program for adult dermatology. Research in MCW dermatology is going strong and continues to grow.


In education, our programs have continued to excel. Our residency program, led by program director Karolyn Wanat, MD and associate program director Stephen Humphrey, MD continues to be one of the most respected in the country. While Doximity rankings are, shall we say, imperfect, they are the only real measure of where we stand and we have been ranked in the top 25 in the country for the last 3 years. Our matches in the last few years have been incredibly competitive and our residents continue to be outstanding. Gretchen Roth, MD has taken our undergraduate medical education program to another level. She has developed numerous programs to not only fit into but lead the new curriculum format at MCW that should lead to even better training for physicians now and in the future. All these efforts have made learning dermatology at MCW at the resident or the student level an outstanding experience.

On a final note, when one reads a retrospective like this, it generally means change is coming. For personal reasons, I've decided to step down as the Chair of the Department. I will plan on staying on as chair until my replacement is found through the ongoing national chair search and I am hoping to stay in the department as long as I'm welcome. The journey of the past seven years has been all the adventure I anticipated when I started. I so much want to thank everyone who has helped me thrive and grow as chair but there isn't enough room on the page. A special thanks to the two incredible vice-chairs in the department, Karolyn Wanat, MD over adult dermatology and Yvonne Chiu, MD over pediatric dermatology. The primary goal of any chair is to have leaders in the department so the chair is pretty extraneous. I am lucky enough for that to be the case. To all of you who have been so supportive of MCW dermatology during my time here, I want to send my unending thanks and health and good fortune in the future.




Dr. Carroll and Dr. Lister enjoy spending time outdoors with their beautiful families and taking care of the patients in the area!





Dermatology Research

The Department of Dermatology has steadily grown its research portfolio over the last year with the addition of several new clinical trials in the areas of inflammatory skin conditions, granulomatous skin disease, and skin cancers. Our Dermatology research team also welcomed two new research fellows in June and July: Mariah Estill (pre-doctoral fellow, Georgetown University) and Nicole Boswell (post-doctoral fellow, Marshall University). We look forward to the continued ability to develop translational research projects and clinical studies to provide our patients with new and exciting opportunities for management and treatment of a wide range of skin conditions.

High-risk squamous cell carcinoma staging and management.

Dr. Melanie Clark and Dr. Shola Vaughn are leading a study at Froedtert and the Milwaukee VA Medical Center with the goal to identify all high-risk cutaneous squamous cell carcinoma skin cancers (T2-T4, AJCC 8th ed) treated at MCW and Zablocki VA Medical Center from 1/1/2007 to present and report the rates of local recurrence, nodal metastasis, distant metastasis, and disease specific death. They hope to identify possible predictors associated with poor outcomes in this cohort (immunosuppression, tumor factors, time of treatment, etc). Additionally, they will evaluate the outcomes of hrSCC treated with only Mohs micrographic surgery compared to those treated with other modalities, including combination treatments (surgery and radiation, surgery and chemotherapy, radiation, and chemotherapy, etc.). They seek to clarify the evidence behind the common practices of diagnostic imaging, SLNB, and adjuvant therapy in the diagnosis and management of hr-cSCCs. Given the current limitations in the literature to support these practices, the intention is to develop evidence-based guidelines within a diagnostic and treatment algorithm for hr-cSCCs. This algorithm will serve as a guide for these practices that can be used across disciplines.

Atopic Dermatitis: An Assessment of Lesional Morphology by Race/Ethnicity

Dr. Yvonne Chiu with the help of our research fellows has been collaborating with other clinical researchers through the Pediatric Dermatology Research Alliance (PeDRA) to better characterize atopic dermatitis in patients with various racial/ethnic backgrounds. Few researchers have studied the varied morphology of atopic dermatitis in people of different racial/ethnic backgrounds. The main objectives are to delineate and compare the frequency of pediatric AD morphologic subtypes across racial/ethnic groups and to provide a mechanism to store detailed morphological data on pediatric patients with AD to support the conduct of future research investigating unique clinical and biological phenotypes of AD. This study of morphologic variation across racial/ethnic groups may lay the groundwork for more inclusive clinical trial design and will ultimately improve therapeutic approaches.
