October 2021: "It's a Custody Case" Assumptions & Myths

CORRECTING ASSUMPTIONS

As you can read and hear about in the resources below, due to gender bias and stereotypes about family court, a "Child Sexual Abuse Penalty" exists for mothers whose children allege abuse during custody disputes (Meier & Dickson, 2017). In 68% of cases when child sexual abuse is alleged against the father by the child/mother, custody is then switched to the father (Meier & Dickson, 2017). These allegations actually increase a father's likelihood of "winning" custody to 81% (Meier & Dickson, 2017). This study also found that when fathers claimed "parental alienation", this often trumped validated allegations of abuse and custody was awarded to the father (Meier & Dickson, 2017). **Overall, mothers are significantly likely to** *lose* custody when their child alleges abuse. This data is contrary to the stereotype or myth that parents (usually mothers) fabricate abuse allegations in order to alienate the father and "win" custody.

Contrary to the "coaching"/"fabricating" labels that tend to be used in these cases to discredit allegations of abuse, there are many credible reasons why children disclose abuse during custody disputes and/or new custody arrangements:

- Increased questioning—the child may be asked more frequently about what occurred and/or how they felt at the other parent's household.
- The offender may have more access to the child one on one.
- The child may experience more time away from the offending parent and feel safer to disclose what is happening to them.
- Concerns of abuse may be the underlying reason for separation in the first place.

Keep in mind also that child sexual abuse is prevalent, occurring in 20% of women and 10% of men. In Wisconsin, 58% of alleged offenders in sexual abuse cases are a parent, stepparent, or parent's significant other. It is also shown in research that the vast majority of disclosures are not false.
