GME Scholars in Global Health Overview

We recognize, with palpable resident growing interest in global health, that a broad-based curriculum of global health principles and concepts, regardless of specialty, is timely and important to developing global physicians. With a cohort of dedicated faculty representing over 10 specialties, a cross cutting global health curriculum to advance global health knowledge, skills, and experience is available for all interested residents.

Rooted in ACGME competencies and [Consortium of Universities for Global Health Education Competencies](#).

Multi-disciplinary interactive didactics (two hour seminars) and resident-led journal clubs occur quarterly.

- Biannual seminars for “deeper dives” for peer to peer learning will occur over a half day (4 hours) and include simulation.
- Emphasis on leadership skills and development in global health will be underlining focus of curriculum including emotional intelligence, resilience, leading from the middle, collaborative problem solving, etc.
- Specialty specific interactive didactics occur twice a year.
- Networking with fellow residents and globally engaged faculty

With a 70% or higher attendance rate, trainees receive a certificate of completion awarded by the Medical College of Wisconsin Office of Global Health.

Training Vision, Mission

Vision: Tomorrow’s global health physician leaders want to make credible contributions, address inequities, improve access to care, and collaborate to make their communities healthy and safe, from neighborhoods to nations.
