EDWIN H. ELLISON, MD



From 1958 to 1969, Edwin H. Ellison, MD, was Professor and the first full-time Chair of Surgery at the Medical College of Wisconsin, then known as the Marquette School of Medicine. As a teacher and as a surgical scientist, he was unexcelled. His untimely death in 1970 prompted

his friends and colleagues to seek a means of perpetuating the Ellison legacy. The Edwin H. Ellison Memorial Lectureship was established to regularly bring leading surgical educators to the Medical College.

Dr. Ellison received his surgical training at The Ohio State University College of Medicine under the tutelage of Robert M. Zollinger, MD. Dr. Ellison served on The Ohio State University faculty from 1944 to 1957. He moved to Milwaukee in 1958. During the next 11 years, his major efforts were the development of a full-time department of surgery for the Medical College, recruitment of outstanding leaders in the surgical specialties, and the newly built research programs in the Allen Bradley research laboratory. Dr. Ellison's vision for training surgical residents culminated in the development of the Marquette University Affiliated Residency Program, which is now known as the Medical College of Wisconsin Affiliated Hospitals, Inc. (MCWAH).

Under his leadership, the faculty made significant contributions to the field of gastrointestinal surgery. These efforts stemmed from Dr. Ellison's earlier work at Ohio State and the discovery with Dr. Zollinger of a new disease entity with interaction between islet cell tumors of the pancreas and the stomach, now widely known as Zollinger-Ellison Syndrome.

Dr. Ellison was a well-known leader in organized medicine and served on the editorial boards of prestigious journals. He contributed 161 papers to scientific literature, and shortly before he died, had compiled illustrative material for Ellison's Atlas of Surgery of the Stomach and Duodenum.

Dr. Ellison's noteworthy contributions to the practice of surgery and his commitment to training future generations of surgeons are embodied in the Edwin H. Ellison Memorial Lectureship.



Jennifer F. Tseng, MD, MPH

Dr. Jennifer F. Tseng was born in Berkeley and grew up in San Jose, California. She attended Stanford University, majoring in English and biological sciences, followed by medical school at the University of California, San Francisco. Dr. Tseng did her surgery residency at Massachusetts General Hospital, where she also served as staff surgeon (super-Chief), followed by a surgical oncology fellowship at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center. Dr. Tseng began her faculty career at the University of Massachusetts Medical Center in 2005; while there, she obtained a master's degree in public health at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. Dr. Tseng was recruited to Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center and Harvard Medical School as Chief of Surgical Oncology in 2011, where she rose to the rank of Professor of Surgery at Harvard. In 2017, she was appointed as the James Utley Professor and Chair of Surgery at Boston University School of Medicine (BUSM) and Surgeon-in-Chief at Boston Medical Center (BMC).

Dr. Tseng is a surgical oncologist whose practice includes pancreas, hepatobiliary, and gastric surgery. She is also a health services researcher focusing on risk prediction and prevention, disparities in surgical and cancer care, and models to build health equity. Dr. Tseng founded the Surgical Outcomes Analysis & Research (SOAR) initiative in 2007. SOAR is now the hub of outcomes research for the BUSM/BMC Department of Surgery. She is the President-elect of The Society for Surgery of the Alimentary Tract, is a founder and a Past President of the Society of Asian Academic Surgeons, is a member of the executive councils of the Society of Surgical Oncology and the Society of University Surgeons, and was recently appointed Chair of the research committee for the American Board of Surgery (ABS), where she is also a member of the ABS Council. Dr. Tseng is a deputy editor for *JAMA Surgery* and serves on a number of editorial boards.

Dr. Tseng has mentored multiple trainees to great success in national and international meetings, funded grants, and peer-reviewed publications, and their achievements are her source of greatest pride.

Dr. Tseng lives with her husband Dr. Marc Sabatine and their two teenage children, Matthew ("Matteo") and Natalie, in greater Boston.
